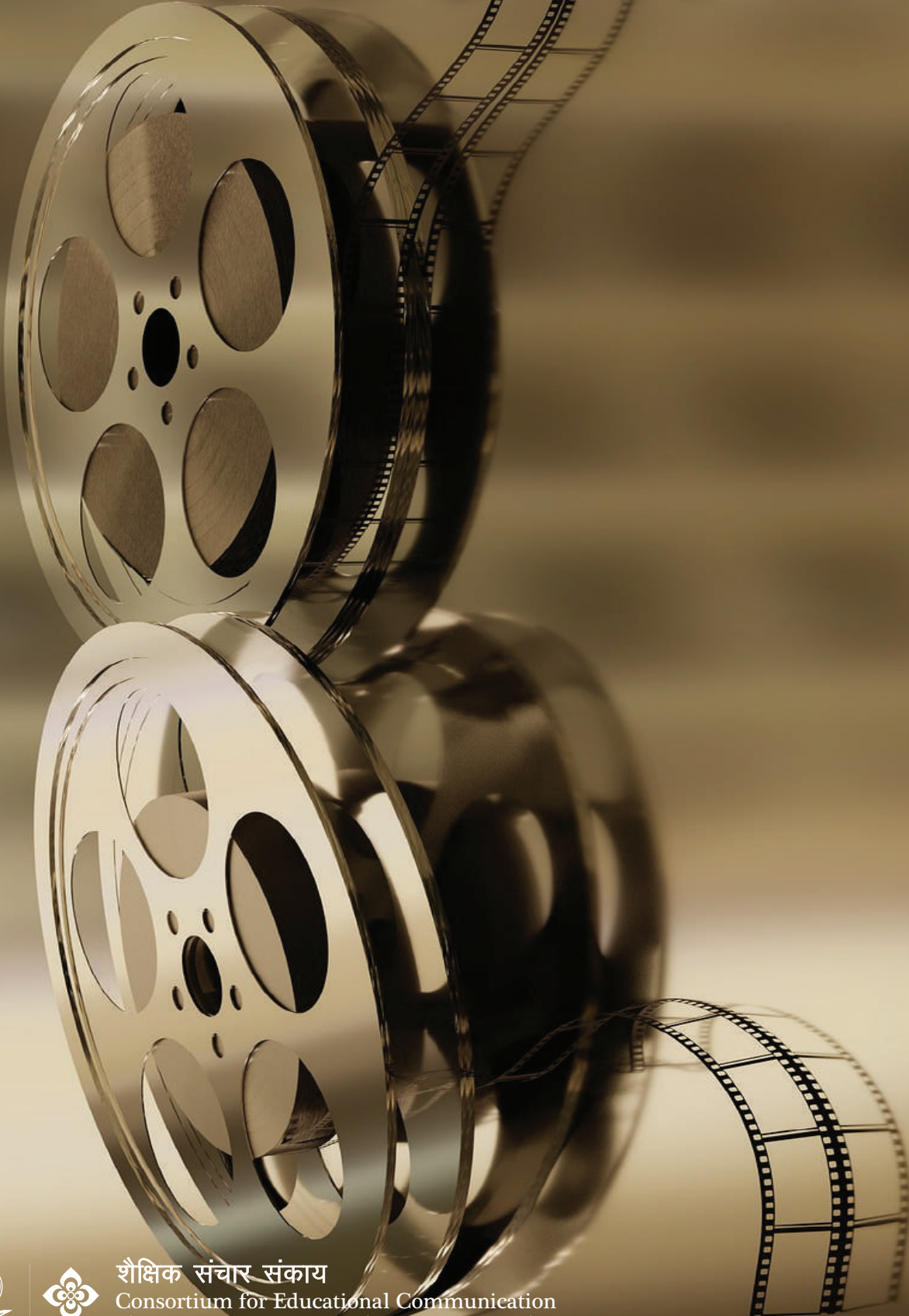

## The Role of Technology in Dental Education

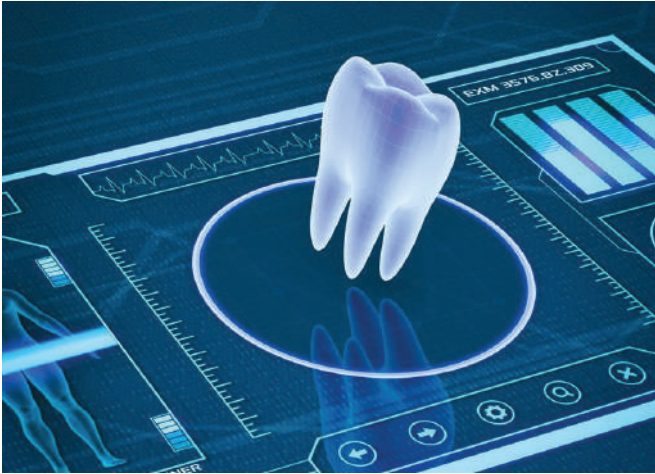
The integration of technology in dental education has transformed traditional classroom settings, utilizing multimedia resources like videos, simula-

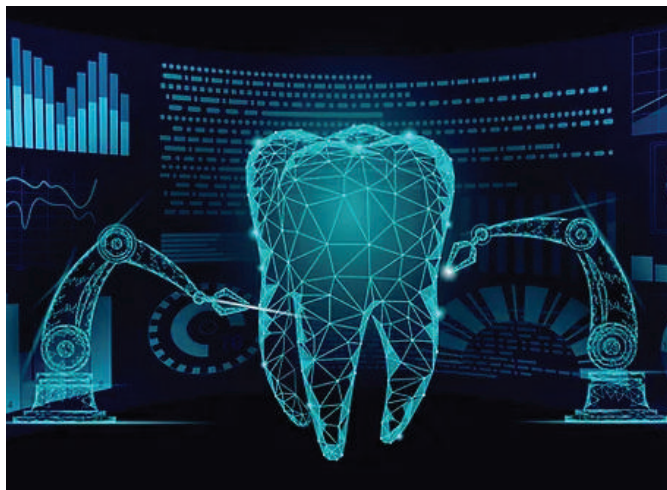

# CYBERCRIME: A HINDRANCE IN THE DIGITALIZATION OF EDUCATION IN INDIA



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**D**igital India and the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, which promote the use of technology in classrooms, have expedited India's adoption of Digital Education in recent years. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the relevance of internet platforms significantly increased. However, this expansion comes with many challenges. The development of digital education in India is at risk due to cybercrime, which includes identity theft, hacking, online harassment, and data breaches. These crimes are becoming more prevalent in recent times, affecting educators, students, and educational institutions alike.

According to the Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre (I4C), phishing attacks increased by more than 30% in 2020. Due to these scams, a large number of people suffered financial losses or had their personal information compromised. As more and more educational institutions, students, and teachers rely on digital platforms, they are vulnerable to several kinds of cyberattacks. These dangers damage confidence in digital learning systems in addition to jeopardizing the security of private data.

The influence of cybercrime on India's digitization of education is discussed in this article based on secondary data resources. The article also explores the causes, effects, and possible remedies to cybercrimes to guarantee a secure learning environment.

## Cybercrime in the Context of Digital Education

Cybercrime in the education sector pertains to unlawful actions aimed at the digital infrastructure, networks, and information utilised by educational establishments. Various prevalent types of cybercrime impacting the education field in India encompass:

**Data Breaches:** Information like test outcomes, student records, and account information for scholarship transfers are regularly maintained by educational institutions. Cybercriminals may access this data by exploiting security flaws, which could result in identity theft, financial fraud, or data breaches. Students may become the target of fraudulent activities as a result.

**Phishing Attacks:** Phishing attacks are unethical attempts to obtain private information by imper-



sonating a trustworthy source. Students and teachers are routinely targeted by email or fake websites in order to get login information for online learning systems.

### **Hacking and Ransomware:**

Cybercriminals could penetrate school systems or virtual classrooms, interrupting instruction and even demanding money for private data. Since ransomware disrupts operations, it can cause serious financial and reputational harm to educational institutions.

**Cyberbullying and Online Harassment:** Through the use of digital platforms, cyberbullying and harassment can affect students' mental health and interfere with their educational experiences. Cyberbullying in school settings has increased as a result of the increased popularity of social media and online forums.

**Malware and Virus Attacks:** Educational facilities and students who obtain content from unreliable sources are at risk of being infected with harmful software and viruses that can damage systems, steal information, or jeopardize the security of educational platforms.

## **Impact Of Cybercrime On The Digitalization Of Education**

### **Loss of Trust in Digital Platforms:**

The loss of trust in digital platforms is a significant barrier to the digital transformation of education. Parents, instructors, and students may be wary about using online learning platforms due to the prevalence of cybercrimes including hacking and data leaks. Reluctance to fully embrace digital educational tools may stem from concerns about financial scams or the exposure of personal information. The reputation of educational institutions is in danger when material is leaked or when students' academic and personal information is made public. Parents and children are more likely to avoid online learning platforms if they believe that their data is at risk.

### **Financial Losses and Resources Diversion:**

Cybercrimes such as ransomware attacks or frauds aimed at digital payment systems can lead to substantial financial damages for educational

establishments. Institutions might need to shift funds towards addressing cyberattacks, like ransom payments or cybersecurity investments, instead of improving education quality.

Smaller private establishments are at a higher risk since they may lack the means to protect themselves from advanced cyberattacks. This financial pressure can restrict the expansion and digital infrastructure advancement of these institutions.

### **Disruption of Learning and Administrative Systems:**

Cyberattacks targeting education systems have the potential to interrupt digital learning, postpone exams, or stop admissions procedures, causing a significant impact on students' academic success and school operations. An instance could be a DDoS (Distributed Denial of Service) attack targeting an online exam platform, which might hinder students' ability to access their exams, causing chaos and uncertainty. Educational platforms utilized for virtual classrooms, communication, and sharing resources are at risk of being disrupted by malware or hacking attempts. This can have a direct impact on students' capability to participate in classes or reach learning resources, diminishing the overall learning process.

### **Privacy Violations and Identity Theft:**

Students and educators face a heightened risk of identity theft and misuse of personal information due to the growing collection of personal data by educational platforms, including contact details, personal documents, and academic history.

A breached database with personal information can result in focused attacks like financial scams or the trading of personal data on the dark web. These raise worry about the confidentiality of students, particularly minors, who are part of online learning programs.

### **Increased Vulnerability for Marginalized Groups:**

The digital divide in India indicates that pupils from disadvantaged families, rural regions, or underprivileged backgrounds might depend on less reliable devices or internet access. This makes them more susceptible to cybercrimes like phishing scams or identity theft. The problem deteriorates because these groups may not know how to keep themselves safe online due to low cybersecurity awareness and education.



## Measures to Combat Cybercrime in Digital Education

### Stronger Cybersecurity Policies and Regulations:

Educational institutions need to establish strong cybersecurity measures to protect their networks and databases. This involves investing in firewalls, encryption, secure login systems, and multi-factor authentication for both employees and students.

The government has the power to make policies that require all educational institutions, especially those handling sensitive information, to implement cybersecurity measures through regulations. Educational institutions should also be motivated to adhere to international data protection rules, like the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

### Promoting Cyber Hygiene and Awareness:

Educating students, teachers, and administrative staff on safe online practices is essential. Training to identify phishing, generate strong passwords, and safeguard personal information must be included in school curriculums and professional development programs on a regular basis. Campaigns and workshops can address cyberbullying, online harassment, and data privacy risks by increasing awareness that promotes cybersecurity in educational environments.

### Developing Secure Learning Platforms:

Security should be a top priority when designing and developing digital education platforms. Regular security audits must be done consistently to find weaknesses, and platforms should use end-to-end encryption for communication, testing, and collaboration tools.

Setting up a secure web-based test platform with biometric verification, video surveillance, and live monitoring helps deter cheating and uphold the credibility of evaluations.

### Collaboration with Law Enforcement:

Educational institutions ought to work together with law enforcement agencies to swiftly report cybercrimes and monitor cybercriminals. Creating a specialized cybersecurity team within organizations can help improve collaboration and speed up reactions to cyber risks. Moreover, the government needs to enhance its response methods to cybercrime and guarantee a more efficient legal system for addressing cybercrime incidents in the education field.

### Ensuring Inclusivity in Digital Education:

In order to narrow the digital divide, government regulations need to guarantee equal access to secure digital devices and internet connections for students from underprivileged backgrounds. Offering monetary assistance and complimentary cybersecurity resources to at-risk students can improve their internet security.

Empowering marginalized communities with digital literacy will help them make informed decisions about online security and lower their risk of cyber threats.

Although digitalization shows much potential for India's education industry, the rising presence of cybercrime presents a notable hurdle to its development and success. Dealing with this challenge entails taking a multifaceted approach, which includes enhancing cybersecurity frameworks, raising awareness, and guaranteeing inclusivity in digital education. India can establish a secure digital learning environment conducive to growth, innovation, and equal education access by tackling cybercrime proactively.

## सीईसी: 16वां प्रकृति अंतर्राष्ट्रीय वृत्तचित्र फिल्म महोत्सव आयोजित

शैक्षिक संचार संकाय (सीईसी) ने शैक्षिक मल्टीमीडिया अनुसंधान केंद्र (ईएमआरसी) जोधपुर के संयुक्त तत्वाधान में 4 से 6 दिसंबर, 2024 तक जयनारायण व्यास स्मृति भवन, जोधपुर में 16वें प्रकृति अंतर्राष्ट्रीय वृत्तचित्र फिल्म महोत्सव का आयोजन किया। महोत्सव का उद्घाटन राजस्थान के माननीय राज्यपाल श्री हरीभाऊ किशनराव बागड़े ने प्रो. जे. बी. नड्डा, निदेशक, सीईसी, प्रो. के. एल. श्रीवास्तव, कुलपति, जयनारायण व्यास विश्वविद्यालय, डॉ. सुनील मेहडू, संयुक्त निदेशक, सीईसी और प्रो. बी. आर. गढ़ी, निदेशक, ईएमआरसी जोधपुर की मौजूदगी में किया।

इस मौके पर राज्यपाल महोदय श्री हरीभाऊ किशनराव बागड़े ने संबोधन में कहा कि आज के वृत्तचित्र भावी पीढ़ियों को हमारे देश के इतिहास-संस्कृति की विश्वदृष्टि प्रदान और आने वाले वर्षों में लाभकारी साबित होंगे। उन्होंने फिल्म महोत्सव के आयोजन की सराहना की और दोहराया कि आज के समय में वृत्तचित्र दृश्य-श्रव्य के प्रभावी साधन-माध्यम हैं, जो देशभर में शिक्षा पहुंचाने में मददगार साबित हो सकते हैं।

सीईसी की अभिप्रेरणा से फिल्म महोत्सव प्रथम बार वर्ष 1997 में आयोजित किया गया। जिसका उद्देश्य फिल्म निर्माताओं, फिल्म प्रेमियों को प्रोत्साहित करना तथा युवाओं को 'पर्यावरण', 'विकास' और 'मानवाधिकार' जैसे विभिन्न महत्वपूर्ण मुद्दों के बारे में जागरूक करना रहा है। अपने शुरुआती वर्षों में यह महोत्सव गैर-प्रतिस्पर्धी और केवल देशभर के फिल्म निर्माताओं तक सीमित रहा। तत्पश्चात अब यह विश्वभर में कई शहरों में आयोजित किया जा चुका है। इस फिल्म महोत्सव को वर्ष 2018 में प्रतिस्पर्धी बनाया गया। जिससे यह दक्षिण-पूर्व एशियाई देशों तक विस्तारित हो रहा है। इसका विस्तार करते और सतत विकास में लोगों की सहभागिता बढ़ाने वाले 'स्वच्छ भारत' अभियान पर वृत्तचित्रों को भी शामिल किया गया।

इस वर्ष के आयोजन में प्रतिष्ठित जूरी सदस्यों द्वारा व्यापक समीक्षा प्रक्रिया के बाद 13 वृत्तचित्रों को चुना। इन फिल्मों को फिल्म निर्माताओं, छात्रों, शिक्षाविदों और मीडियाकर्मियों की मौजूदगी में महोत्सव के दौरान प्रदर्शित किया गया। महोत्सव में प्रो. एस.एन. जोशी, प्रसिद्ध फोटोग्राफर एवं दर्शनशास्त्र विभाग प्रमुख, जेएनवीयू के द्वारा फोटोग्राफी और वृत्तचित्र निर्माण पर एक ज्ञानवर्धक कार्यशाला भी आयोजित की गई। वार्षिक मीडिया कार्यक्रम में फिलीपींस, म्यांमार और बांग्लादेश सहित दक्षिण पूर्व एशियाई देशों से कुल 68 प्रविष्टियां प्राप्त हुईं। विजेता निर्देशकों को चार श्रेणियों में पचास-पचास हजार रुपये की पुरस्कार राशि और स्क्रीनिंग प्रमाण-पत्र, ट्रॉफी भी प्रदान की गई।

**पर्यावरण:** वाणी प्रकाश दास द्वारा निर्मित 'फाइट फॉर राइट' में असम के वनों में हाथियों और आम क्षेत्रवासियों के बीच संघर्षों की कहानी को बयान किया गया है। इस अस्तित्व बचाने के संघर्षों में पिछले एक दशक में कुल 812 लोगों और 900 हाथियों की दर्दनाक मौत हो गई साथ ही असम में वनों के अंधाधुंध कटान से हाथियों का पड़ोसी राज्य अरुणाचल और मेघालय में पलायन हो रहा है। इसमें इन कारणों से ऊपजी स्थिति को अस्तित्व बचाने की प्रक्रिया के रूप में उजागर किया गया है।

**विकास:** पी. रघुपति द्वारा निर्मित 'रीचिंग द अनरीचड' में उस्मानिया विश्वविद्यालय के पत्रकारिता विभाग के छात्र संतोष एसराम की प्रेरक यात्रा को दर्शाया गया है। जिसमें उन्होंने कोविड-19 की त्रासदी में दंडकारण्य के दूरस्थ वनों में 9 भीम चिल्ड्रन हैम्पिनेस केंद्र बनाकर अस्थाई स्कूल के रूप में संचालित किया।

**मानवाधिकार:** साजिद नादुथोडी द्वारा निर्मित 'रेज्ड ऑन रीथ्स' में एक मां और उसके बेटे के बीच के रिश्तों की कहानी बताई गई है। इसमें बताया गया है कि मां को जब पता चला कि उसका बेटा एक असामान्य बीमारी से ग्रसित है तो वो कैसे वो उसकी परवरिश करती है। इस वृत्तचित्र में अपने बेटे के प्रतिभा को पोषित करने के मां के प्रयासों को बताया गया है। वह संगीत चिकित्सा के माध्यम से अपने बेटे को संवारती है और अंततः खुद एक गायिका और संगीत निर्देशक बन जाती है।

**स्वच्छ भारत:** प्रकाश कत्रे द्वारा निर्मित 'ग्रीन मैन' में स्वच्छ भारत अभियान के माध्यम से भोपाल (मध्य प्रदेश) में स्वच्छता, साफ-सफाई के प्रति जागरूकता बढ़ाने वाले व्यक्ति की उल्लेखनीय कहानी है। जो यह संदेश प्रचारित करता है कि स्वच्छता किसी एक का काम नहीं बल्कि हर देशवासी का कर्तव्य है।

पुरस्कृत और महोत्सव में प्रदर्शित-चयनित वृत्तचित्र सीईसी की आधिकारिक वेबसाइट ([www.cec.nic.in](http://www.cec.nic.in)) पर उपलब्ध हैं। वैश्विक स्तर पर डिजिटल शिक्षा के प्रचार-प्रसार और इसमें दिए संदेश के माध्यम से जागरूक करने के साथ ही दर्शक इसका आनंद उठा सकते हैं।

## CEC organises the 16th Prakriti International Documentary Film Festival

The Consortium for Educational Communication (CEC) and EMRC Jodhpur organised the 16<sup>th</sup> Prakriti International Documentary Film Festival from the 4<sup>th</sup> to the 6<sup>th</sup> of December, 2024 at Jai Narain Vyas Smriti Bhawan, Jodhpur. The festival was inaugurated by Shri Haribhau Kisanrao Bagde, Hon'ble Governor of Rajasthan, along with Prof. J. B. Nadda, Director, CEC, Prof. K.L. Shrivastava, Vice-Chancellor, Jai Narain Vyas University (JNVU), Dr. Sunil Mehru, Joint Director, CEC and Mr. B.R. Gadi, Director, EMRC Jodhpur.

Addressing the audience, the Hon'ble Governor of Rajasthan, Shri Haribhau Kisanrao Bagde highlighted how documentaries of today will provide a worldview of our country's history and culture to the future generations and prove beneficial beyond years. He appreciated the organization of the film festival and reiterated how documentaries can be an effective medium in today's times, taking education across the country as it is an audio-visual aid.

The film festival, a brainchild of CEC, was first organised in 1997 to encourage filmmakers and film enthusiasts to participate in and to make the youth aware of several issues of importance under different categories such as 'Environment', 'Development' and 'Human Rights'. Non-competitive and limited to Indian filmmakers in its early days, the festival has travelled to several venues across India. The festival was made competitive in 2018, expanding its jurisdiction to South-east Asia, all the while expanding its scope to include documentaries on the 'Swacch Bharat' or Clean India Campaign promoting people's participation in sustainable development.

This year, 13 documentaries were shortlisted after a comprehensive review by eminent members of the Jury. These films were screened at the festival congregating filmmakers, students, academicians and media persons. An insightful workshop on Photography and Documentary making was also conducted by Prof. S.N. Joshi, eminent photographer and Head of Department, Philosophy, JNVU during the festival. An annual media event, a total of 68 entries were received by the festival from Southeast Asian countries including Philippines, Myanmar and Bangladesh. The winning directors were awarded fifty thousand rupees each under four categories, in addition to a screening certificate and a trophy, as follows:

**Environment: Fight for Right** by **Bani Prakash Das** shows the ongoing conflict between humans and wild elephants in the state of Assam. Over 10 years, a total of 812 people and 900 elephants have been killed as a consequence of these conflicts stemming from rapid deforestation in Assam and migration of elephants from Arunachal Pradesh and Meghalaya. It highlights the push and pull between humans and elephants for their rightful resources.

**Development: Reaching the Unreached** by **P.Raghupati** follows the inspiring journey of Santosh Eeram, a journalism student from Osmania University who established Bheem Children's Happiness Centres; make-shift schools, in 9 remote habitats of the Dandakararanya forests during the COVID-19 pandemic.

**Human Rights: Raised on Rhythms** by **Sajeed Naduthody** explores the relationship between a mother and her son after she discovers that he has Down Syndrome. The documentary visualizes the incredible journey of a mother discovering her own talents as she makes way for her son through music therapy and opportunities in the film industry, eventually becoming a singer and music director herself.

**Swachh Bharat: Green Man** by **Prakash Katre** chronicles the remarkable tale of one man's dedication to raising awareness and fostering a culture of cleanliness and hygiene in Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh through the Swachh Bharat Campaign delivering the message that cleanliness is not the job of one person but the duty of every person in India.

These winning documentaries and those selected for screening at the festival are available on CEC's official website ([www.cec.nic.in](http://www.cec.nic.in)) for the public to enjoy and promote the cause of digital education on a global front. Prof. J.B. Nadda, Director, CEC and Prof.(Doc) Avinash Kumar Aggarwal, IIT Jodhpur, awarded the winners during the valedictory function. Dr. Aggarwal greatly appreciated the film festival with its varied themes. During his speech he talked about how such film festivals are an inspiration for students and would motivate other organizations to adopt and utilize documentaries as a medium of education.

Prof. J. B. Nadda addressed the audience and appreciated all the filmmakers and directors in attendance during the closing ceremony. The event was attended by EMRC Directors/members, faculty members of JNUV and affiliated colleges, as well as academics, students, and members of the film fraternity in large numbers. ## 3 Day International Seminar on Artificial Intelligence, Educational Communication, and Media Transformations at EMRC EFLU

The Consortium for Educational Communication and the EMRC, English and Languages University (EFLU), Hyderabad, jointly organized a 3-day International Seminar on "Artificial Intelligence, Educational Communication, and Media Transformations" from the 28<sup>th</sup> to the 30<sup>th</sup> of November, 2024. The workshop delved into how Artificial Intelligence is reshaping the educational landscape highlighting innovative AI tools and applications that personalize learning, enhance engagement and streamline administrative tasks.

Prof. J. B. Nadda, Director, (CEC), Prof. Lakshmi Haribandi, Vice-Chancellor (in charge) of EFLU and Prof. T.T. Sreekumar, Director, EMRC EFLU inaugurated the seminar. Chief Guest, Prof. J.B. Nadda emphasized upon AI's transformative role in revolutionizing education. He highlighted how AI is personalizing learning, fostering inclusivity, and democratizing knowledge.

Various sessions and panel discussions covering diverse topics ranging from AI's role in education to digital storytelling and cultural preservation were organised by subject experts and industry experts during the seminar. Prof. Sundeeep R. Muppidi, Professor of Digital Media and Journalism at the University of Hartford, USA, emphasized the ethical challenges posed by AI, including biased decision-making and the erosion of originality. Prof. Haribandi Lakshmi, Vice-Chancellor (In-Charge), highlighted AI's potential pitfalls and advocated for embedding ethics into its development while safeguarding privacy and data security.

Dr. Shatrudha, Research Scientist, CEC, presented insights on the intersection of AI and educational multimedia. He emphasized the role of cutting-edge AI tools in enhancing educational content creation and delivery while ensuring inclusivity and accessibility. He also coordinated the smooth organisation of the workshop along with Prof. T T Sreekumar, EFLU.

The seminar featured 24 thematic sessions and panel discussions on diverse aspects of AI, such as its role in language education, educator perspectives, cultural narratives, sustainability, and post human perspectives. ### Excerpt from the Lecture

Network Science is recognized as a multidisciplinary field that investigates the structure and behaviour of interconnected systems. A network is defined by nodes, representing entities such as individuals, locations, or devices; and edges denote the relationships or interactions between these nodes. Networks are widely applied to model complex real-world systems in social, technological, and biological domains.

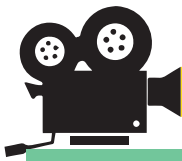
The lecture focuses on the essential properties of networks with case studies, including:

- **Sustainable applications:** Several sustainable applications are explored using graph theoretic concepts and network science.
- **Network-based measures:** Various centrality measures are incorporated for determining the influence or importance of nodes in a network.
- **Information spread analysis:** Model formulations are included to examine the rate of information spread in the network over time.
- **Tools and repositories:** Relevant tools, libraries and programmable APIs are provided for visualizations and network analysis

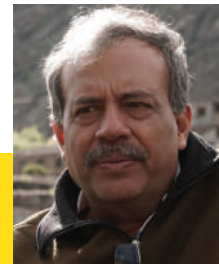
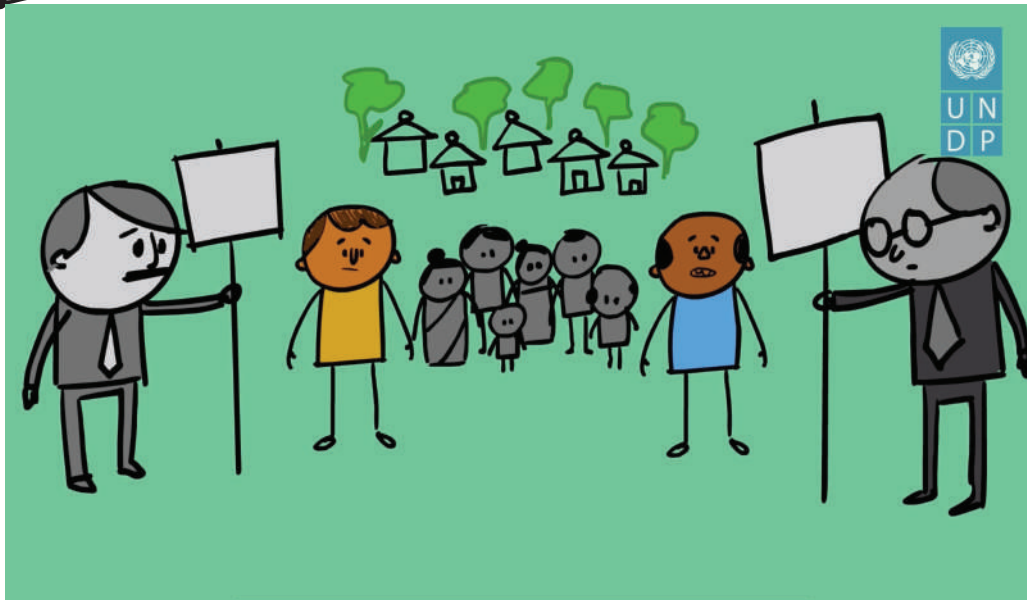

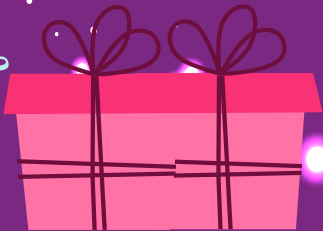
