

### FILMMAKING AND ACADEMICS: THE EMERGING INTERFACE AT EMRCS

n an era marked by the convergence of media, technology, and education, the role of filmmaking in academics is undergoing a remarkable transfor-

mation. The increasing role of film/cinema studies across academic disciplines is one thing, but the role of the same technology in filmmaking and digital content generation for educational purposes is altogether a different issue. It is in this field that filmmaking and academics collaborate to form a fertile interaction between seemingly different fields of cinema and academics. This shift is particularly visible in the work of India's Educational Multimedia Research Centres (EMRCs), which have long served as the backbone of digital content production for higher education under the Consortium for Educational Communication (CEC), a UGC initiative.

EMRCs were conceptualised as hubs where education meets media innovation. Originally tasked with producing educational television and multimedia content, they have adapted to new demands with the rise of online education platforms like SWAYAM, MOOCs, and digital classrooms. The content created in these centres bridges the gap between the

conventional classrooms and the evolving media habits of learners. With technological innovations, the output of EMRCs has evolved from the feed to Countrywide Classroom—the University Grants Commission (UGC) and Doordarshan (DD), launched in the 1980s—to a modern portal and DTH-based distribution.

Unlike commercial media, EMRCs operate with a distinct academic orientation. Their mandate is not entertainment, but education. Yet, their tools and workflows draw heavily from the grammar of cinema—visual language, editing, and sound design. In this way, EMRCs serve as laboratories for exploring how filmic techniques can enhance comprehension, engagement, and retention of complex academic material.

EMRC Patiala has launched a Media Lab to create a dynamic collaborative space to integrate evolving modern technology with digital content creation for educational purposes. In this lab student interns will be involved in the production and post-production of the content created in EMRC Patiala. This initiative democratises the content creation process in an



academic space and encourages students to become part of the production process, where they can explore career options as digital content creators for educational purposes.

Moreover, students involved in such a project will gain skills that are increasingly valuable in the job market. In today's academic and professional land-scapes, the ability to produce, edit, and distribute content is as critical as traditional academic literacy. The Media Lab, therefore, is not only an educational facility but also a career incubator.

The lab will provide hands-on experience in content creation and cultivate a deeper understanding of how media can shape the learning process. Students gain exposure to production techniques and learn to critically assess how visual storytelling can convey abstract ideas, scientific concepts, and theoretical frameworks. In doing so, the Media Lab becomes a training ground for the next generation of academic communicators. In the process, EMRC expects to improve the quality and visual presentation of content.

The academic-filmmaking interface challenges the rigid binaries between scholarship and storytelling. At EMRCs, scholars and filmmakers/content creators collaborate to translate disciplinary knowledge into visual narratives. A lecture on Punjab history, for instance, might be transformed into a visual story which will mobilise interviews, animation, archival footage, representative images and location footage.

A philosophy module could incorporate re-enactments or dramatised dialogues to explain complex ideas. In this process, the intent remains that knowledge is not to be diluted, but re-contextualised in formats that appeal to visual learners and digital natives.

Filmmaking in academic contexts also fosters an interdisciplinary approach, which is central to the contemporary enterprise of higher education. Modern content creation space can be envisioned as a shared space of Historians, scientists, linguists, and artists working alongside cinematographers,

editors, and sound designers. This collaborative ethos aligns with the spirit of liberal education, where knowledge is not compartmentalised but shared and synthesised across domains.

Despite the promise, this interface is not without challenges. Academic content must maintain intellectual rigour, even as it adapts to the aesthetics of visual media. However, the opportunities outweigh the hurdles. For example, in the last couple of years, EMRC Patiala has emerged as a centre of innovation where knowledge, technology, and creativity meet. Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) from across India have contributed to the production of MOOCs and DTH: VIDHIK. The newly developed Media Lab will now bridge the gap between SMEs and professionals involved in post-production, which was primarily outsourced earlier.

The interface between filmmaking and academics is no longer a novelty—it is a necessity in the digital age. With initiatives like the Media Lab at EMRC Patiala, this interface is being institutionalised, offering new modes of knowledge production and dissemination.

Most of the discussions about the future of education assume that the future of education will be visual, interactive, and collaborative. And in this future, the EMRCs will continue to play a vital role, not just as production houses, but as academic media ecosystems that nurture innovation, inclusivity, and excellence.

### FROM SILENCE TO SIGN, FROM TEXT TO TOUCH: MAKING SWAYAM INCLUSIVE THROUGH ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

n the rapidly growing domain of digital education, ensuring inclusion remains a critical challenge, particularly for learners with sensory access needs, such as those affected by hearing or vision impairments. MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) have revolutionised access to knowledge for millions in India, yet their design and delivery lack when it comes to the needs of learners with hearing or visual impairments. SWAYAM, India's premier MOOC initiative designed to promote equitable learning, can now embrace a more inclusive vision to truly serve all learners.

Incorporating accessibility measures into SWAYAM's ecosystem is an urgent imperative to create a more equitable digital learning environment. The central focus here is to discuss the practical pathways for the integration of the tools and technologies such as the Bhashini Project, linguistic computing tools, and Braille-supportive software like Akhar into the SWAYAM ecosystem. It advocates for the use of technologies such as Indian Sign Language (ISL) overlays, text-to-speech (TTS) and speech-to-text (STT) applications,

Braille-compatible content, and AI-based transcription engines—all of which can significantly enhance the accessibility of online courses.

### **Understanding the Digital Divide in MOOCs**

The growth of digital education in India, driven by platforms like SWAYAM, has opened new learning opportunities for the learners across the country. However, a significant segment of learners with disabilities—particularly those who are blind, visually impaired, or deaf—remain marginalised due to structural and technological barriers. This digital divide is less about devices or internet connectivity but more about the absence of accessible content formats, interface design challenges, and a lack of assistive features.

For visually impaired learners, the greatest challenge begins with incompatibility with screen readers, missing alternative text for visuals, and content designs that rely heavily on visual elements. Many courses include infographics like graphs, flowcharts etc., animations, and interactive videos without accompanying the descriptions or tactile alternatives, making them inaccessible



without significant adaptation. Navigation of learning management system (LMS) also poses difficulties due to the absence of structured layouts, keyboard shortcuts, clear headings, and text-based alternatives.

On the other hand, auditory-impaired learners encounter different challenges, especially when video lectures lack ISL interpretation or even basic closed captions. Spoken language, especially in Indian English with regional variations or accent, poses difficulties for lip reading or comprehension without transcription support. These structural limitations force learners to rely on external assistance, undermining the self-paced and independent learning promise that MOOCs aim to deliver.

The exclusion of learners with disabilities is often embedded in the course development process itself. Accessibility audits are rarely conducted, and persons with disabilities are seldom consulted in content creation. While international platforms like Coursera and edX are gradually adopting universal design principles, Indian MOOCs platforms—including SWAYAM—must advance rapidly.

Accessibility is not just a matter of compliance but a commitment to educational justice. The mandate under the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016 and international conventions like the UNCRPD (United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities) make it imperative for educational platforms to cater to the diverse needs of all learners.

Furthermore, India's National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 strongly advocates for inclusive education, emphasising the development of barrier-free access to digital content for all learners. Section 6.8 of NEP 2020 outlines the need for barrier-free access, calling for digital content to be made accessible through assistive technologies, especially for children with disabilities.

In this context, SWAYAM has a critical opportunity to emerge as a leader in inclusive digital education. Leveraging national projects and indigenous technological innovations, it can transform the learning experience for students with sensory disabilities. But to do so, it must first acknowledge the current gaps and prioritise accessibility from the foundation ensuring that no learner is left behind.

### **Enabling Ecosystem towards Inclusive Learning**

Over the past decade, India has demonstrated its commitment for inclusive education through both policy and practice. Although SWAYAM marks a landmark achievement in democratising access to learning, it now needs to pivot toward systemic inclusivity. Several forward-looking projects and researchers have been working on this front, paving the way for integration into mainstream MOOCs.

### **National and Governmental Initiatives:**

• The Bhashini Project (https://bhashini.gov.in): Launched by Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY), the Bhashini initiative develops AI-based tools for Indian language processing. Its speech-to-text and text-to-speech capabilities can be harnessed to generate captions, read-aloud features, and translations on SWAYAM. Its open-source nature enables institutions to tailor applications for specific disciplines and regional contexts. The Bhashini app, available on iOS and Android platforms, launched under the National Language Translation Mission, leverages AI to provide real-time speech-to-text and text-to-speech services in multiple languages, promoting linguistic inclusion. It plays a pivotal role in enhancing accessibility for learners with sensory disabilities by enabling multilinqual captions, transcripts, and audio interfaces across digital platforms like SWAYAM.

- Indian Sign Language Research and Training Centre (ISLRTC): Established under the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, the Indian Sign Language Research and Training Centre (ISLRTC) has developed more than 10,000 educational terms in Indian Sign Language (ISL), and translations of NCERT textbooks for students from Class I to XII. Many of these resources are now publicly hosted on DIKSHA and YouTube. The ISLRTC-trained interpreters could be contracted for on-screen ISL overlays in SWAYAM video lectures, starting with foundational and humanities-based courses.
- Sugamya Pustakalaya (https://www.sugamyapustakalaya.org.in): Launched by the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD), this digital library offers massive repositories of accessible digital content, available in audio, Braille, and large print. SWAYAM course developers can link course readings and supplementary materials to DAISY formats available in Sugamya Pustakalaya.
- National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Visual Disabilities (NIEPVD) (https://niepvd.nic.in): Established under Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India and functioning under Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD), NIEPVD has developed digital talking books, screen-reader-compatible tutorials and training modules for teachers to create accessible educational content. NIEPVD, with its training programmes and digital content development, can support capacity building among SWAYAM instructors and coordinators.

### **Academic and Research Innovations**

• Indigenous Innovations in NLP and Tactile Learning for Inclusive Education: Dr. Vishal Goyal and Dr. Williamjeet Singh of Punjabi University, Patiala, have led pioneering efforts to promote digital accessibility for learners with sensory impairments. Dr. Goyal has developed key tools such as text-to-speech engines, intelligent spell-checkers, and predictive text systems to enhance the learning experience for students with visual impairments. His team has also created a machine translation framework capable of converting English text into animated Indian Sign Language (ISL) videos, thereby making educational content more accessible to deaf learners. In parallel, Dr. William-



jeet Singh has focused on developing tactile and auditory learning solutions, including affordable Braille printing technologies and mobile-based navigation tools designed for learners with vision loss. His innovations are particularly impactful in providing offline access to digital learning in underserved and remote regions. Together, their work forms a comprehensive, locally developed technological foundation that can be effectively integrated into platforms like SWAYAM to support truly inclusive education.

- Akhar 2021 Braille-compatible Word processor (https://akhariwp.com): This freeware processor, developed by Prof Gurpreet Singh Lehal, enables users to type, transliterate, and translate text across scripts such as Devanagari, Gurmukhi, and Shahmukhi. It also facilitates the conversion of Unicode-based digital text into Braille. The software can serve a valuable resource in bridging the gap between digital content creation and tactile output-making it an ideal tool for converting SWAYAM textual material into Braille for visually impaired learners. This can be particularly helpful for exam preparation materials, textbook excerpts, assignment sheets, and even course summaries.
- Bookshare India (https://www.bookshare.org): An online library for people with reading barriers, has partnered with over 600 Indian institutions to offer accessible digital books in DAISY, EPUB3, MP3, and Braille-ready formats. Many university textbooks and vocational training materials are already available. SWAYAM can align its reading material (especially for UG humanities, commerce, and arts courses) with Bookshare's content formats. More importantly, Bookshare's EPUB3 format supports embedded image descriptions and text navigation.

### A Roadmap to Assistive Integration in SWAYAM

To build a truly inclusive learning environment, SWAYAM must adopt a multi-pronged integration strategy focusing on content, platform, and learner engagement.

- Enhancing Content Accessibility: MOOC content on SWAYAM—primarily consisting of video lectures, PDF transcripts, quizzes, and discussion forums—needs to be restructured to ensure accessibility by design.
  - Add ISL overlays and auto-generated real-time transcripts (via Bhashini) to all video lectures.
  - Ensure image-based content includes audio descriptions or alternative text.
  - Convert all text materials into Braille-ready formats using Akhar and similar tools.
- Strengthening Platform Architecture: SWAYAM's architecture, developed largely on open-source tools, can be enhanced through modular plug-ins and third-party tool integrations.
  - Embed APIs from Bhashini for Text to Speech (TTS)/ (Speech to Text) STT functionalities and multilingual translation. Speech-to-Text (STT) for lecture transcription, Text-to-Speech (TTS) for course navigation and reading out textual content and Multilingual translation to convert content from Hindi/English text into regional languages, thereby promoting inclusivity for linguistic minorities. Learners would be able to toggle accessibility features like "Read Aloud," "Auto Translate," or "Sign Language View" as needed.
  - Design a multimodal interface with voice-enabled navigation, voice-enabled search and keyboard-only access for visually impaired users.
  - Courses should offer offline downloadable modules with TTS narration and Braille-compatible text, allowing institutions to run offline learning hubs for disabled students, especially in rural India.
- Learner-Centric Support Systems

Inclusivity extends beyond content and platform—it

requires ongoing learner engagement and support systems.

- Establish a dedicated accessibility helpdesk with support in ISL and regional languages.
- Encourage community learning hubs using tactile and auditory tools.
- Develop a standard accessibility checklist for all content creators on SWAYAM.

SWAYAM has played a pivotal role in expanding access to quality education across India. However, true educational equity cannot be achieved unless the platform proactively supports learners with sensory and cognitive disabilities. With a wide array of assistive technologies now available—and supported by national policies and indigenous innovations—the time is ripe to transform SWAYAM into a fully accessible learning ecosystem.

Several government-led initiatives and research-based tools—such as Sugamya Pustakalaya, Bhashini, Akhar 2021, and ISL content developed by ISLRTC—demonstrate the immense potential for inclusive digital learning. These resources, if systematically integrated, can bridge the existing accessibility gaps and empower learners with hearing and visual impairments to engage meaningfully with online content.

Institutions like IGNOU, NCERT, and IIT Delhi have already begun laying the foundation for accessible education. Their pioneering efforts, combined with policy frameworks like the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act and NEP 2020, offer a strong scaffolding for inclusive transformation. What is now needed is a clear institutional intent, cross-sectoral collaboration, and a commitment to universal design in content development.

By embracing inclusivity not as an afterthought but as a foundational principle, SWAYAM can evolve from being a digital repository to becoming a model of accessible education.

As India scales its digital education efforts, platforms like SWAYAM must move beyond content delivery to embody the principles of accessibility and inclusion—ensuring that every learner, regardless of ability, finds a place in the digital classroom.

### सीईसी: 32वीं वित्त समिति की बैठक आयोजित

शैक्षिक संचार संकाय (सीईसी) के वित्त समिति की 32वीं बैठक 28 मई, 2025 को सीईसी परिसर में आयोजित की गई।

प्रो. जे. बी. नड्डा, निदेशक, सीईसी ने डॉ. निखिल कुमार, उप-सचिव, यूजीसी, प्रो. वसुधा कामत, अध्यक्षा, शासी निकाय, वित्त सिमिति, श्री सँजय श्रीवास्तवा, सदस्य-सचिव (मुख्य प्रशासनिक अधिकारी, सीईसी) के साथ सिमिति के अन्य सदस्यों श्री सुदीप सिंह जैन और प्रो. मनुकोंडा रबीन्द्रनाथ का स्वागत किया। यूजीसी सिचव के प्रतिनिधि के रूप में वित्तीय सलाहकार, यूजीसी भी इस बैठक में उपस्थित रहे।

प्रो. जे. बी. नड्डा, निदेशक, सीईसी ने संकाय की विभिन्न गतिविधियों और नवीन पहल के बारे में संक्षिप्त जानकारी प्रस्तुत की। उन्होंने सिमिति को मूक्स पाठ्यक्रम के विकास के विभिन्न पहलुओं- जैसे प्रदत्त, परीक्षा, प्रमाणन और शिक्षार्थी सहायता डेस्क के संचालन के संबंध में विस्तृत जानकारी दी। निदेशक ने इस बारे में भी जानकारी साझा की कैसे सीईसी और इससे संबद्ध 21 मीडिया केंद्र (ईएमआरसी) अन्य भारतीय भाषाओं में मूक्स विकास के साथ ही तीन वर्ष पहले निर्मित मूक्स पाठ्यक्रमों के उन्नयन और संवर्द्धन भी कर रहे हैं। सीईसी इसके साथ ही यूजीसी के च्वाइस बेस्ड क्रेडिट सिस्टम (सीबीसीएस) के आधार पर स्नातक डिग्री छात्रों के लिए विविध विषयों में तीन वर्षीय डिग्री पाठ्यक्रम आधारित नवीन मूक्स निर्माण करने में भी संलग्नरत है। बैठक में स्वयंप्रभा प्लेटफॉर्म पर सीईसी से संचालित-संबद्ध उच्च शिक्षण चैनल के दर्शकों की संख्या पर भी चर्चा की गई।

The 32nd Finance meeting of CEC was held on the 28th of May 2025, on CEC premises.



Prof. J.B. Nadda, Director, CEC, gave a brief presentation about the various activities and initiatives of CEC. He apprised the Committee in detail about the various aspects of the development of MOOCs, such as the delivery, examinations, certification, and maintenance of the student help desk. He also highlighted how CEC and its 21 media centres are developing MOOCs in other Indian languages, along with the upgradation and revision of 3-year-old MOOCs. CEC is also designing new MOOCs based on the 3-year degree programs for students of Bachelor's degrees in various subjects based on UGC's Choice-Based Credit System. SWAYAM Prabha's viewership of CEC's higher education channels was also discussed during the meeting.

Capital Budgeting is a widely accepted technique to evaluate decisions pertaining to fixed assets which involve current outlay or a series of outlays, but are likely to produce benefits over a period of time longer than one year in future. This includes addition, disposition, modification and replacement of fixed assets. This process includes four distinct but interrelated steps used to evaluate and select long-term proposals: Proposal Generation, Evaluation, Selection and Follow-Up. This lecture talks about the importance and limitations of the capital budgeting technique while focusing upon the three decision situations: Accept-Reject Decisions, Mutually Exclusive Decisions and Rationing Decisions. Further, this lecture emphasizes the importance of understanding why Cash Flows and not Accounting Profits are used in the capital budgeting technique. Lastly, the adjustments pertaining to working capital, taxes, depreciation and effect on other projects/products are discussed with the help of examples from the industry.


